Janet Stewart Connector Trail

We are excited to announce the progress we are making on a connector track between Janet Stewart Reserve and the Styx River Esplanade Reserve. The new single track route is 700 meters long and joins two beautiful reserves. When complete the track will open access to a 4km, out and back, tramp along the Pūharakekenui and move us one step closer to the creation of a source to sea walkway.

The section we are working on was planted approximately 20 years ago, but has been left unmanaged. This led to an impassable tangled mess of invasive plants woven into a stand of stunning mature, native trees.

The first 2 events involved the local community and volunteers and resulted in hauling out nearly 10 big bags of trash, a TV, tires, a rug and numerous car parts. We have trimmed back trees, battled brambles and are beginning to cut a trail on a fairly steep bank to make the track accessible for the community to enjoy. On a grassy section of the track, artist Simon Rutherford is sampling the use of woven Harakeke panels to guide hikers while keeping the grass at bay.

With 80% of the track now cleared, we are nearly ready to move on to invasive plant management, planting and positioning trail markers.

Our next track building event will be on August 9th between 10-1pm. Aiming for a final session and soft launch of the route on Saturday August 19th!



Update from Beth

What a quarter! Over 4000 trees planted in community plantings, a surprise tree drop to doorsteps around Murchison Park, an augmented reality project, water quality markers installed, an underwater video series, Matariki flag making workshops, a colouring book created, multiple submissions, refreshed education programmes, tours, research projects and much more.

This guarter has been extremely busy for our staff/volunteers with a number of projects on the go. MPI plantings at Styx Loop Conservation Reserve (dedicated to those that have served in the NZ Defence Force) and Pūharakekenui/Styx Esplanade Reserve (dedicated to all of our volunteers whose bright ideas, passion and efforts have kept us in operation for over 21 years) are well under way. Our education activities have also expanded with the addition of Dan Grima to the crew who is working with schools and creating viral educational content on our social media channels.

Make sure you check out our facebook/instagram channels to see cheeky tuna (eels), project updates,

events, and upcoming conservation week activities - including an art exhibition, photo competition, invertebrate monitoring and weaving activities.

Spotlight on a Project -

A project highlight this quarter was undoubtedly the Murchison Park Tree Canopy Project funded by the Sustainability Fund which saw 1040 trees surprise dropped to households around Murchison Park on the 8th of June to increase tree canopy, sequester carbon and create habitat for wildlife such as bush birds.

Residents around Murchison Park woke up to find a surprise tree on their doorstep as well as a gift certificate for a free tree from Trees for Canterbury(our project partner). Residents were encouraged to plant the trees in their backvard or bring their tree along to a planting session in Murchison Park where residents could also have feedback into future planting plans for the Park. If all trees were planted then tree canopy in the Murchison Park area could have increased by 4%. The fate of the trees is being investigated by third-year University of Canterbury Geography students to determine if tree drops such as this are a successful method to increase tree canopy and contribute to Christchurch City Council's greenhouse gas emission reduction targets.

Update from the Trust

It's been such an exciting time in the Pūharakekenui neck of the woods. The Styx Living Laboratory Trust has joined the CCC's Community Waterways Partnership, which is an exciting conduit to collaboration and sharing learning with other local river care groups in Waitaha Canterbury.

Planting season is in full swing and we've had some delightful spring-feeling days - as much as we need rainfall for our plant survival, spending the day in the field for our crew on a clear Christchurch stunner is definitely a perk of the job.

We had the privilege of showing staff from the Ministry for the Environment around the work sites that Project Kōtare had been working on. They're overwhelmingly happy with the progress of our project, which I have no doubt can be attributed to Anita and Gareth's leadership of our awesome team.

The next round of our Creative Communicator applications is now open. You can find all of the details on our website for this opportunity, which operates similarly to an artist in residence - allowing for a number of creatives to interpret the Styx catchment in new ways over the coming year.

To celebrate our 4 incredible artists that we had on site in 2022/2023, we are holding an art exhibition in the old information centre at the Botanic Gardens during Conservation Week. Keep your eyes on our Facebook page for information around the exhibition as well as an invitation to the special exhibition opening.

Update from Anita

Project Kōtare has just finished year two of the five-year project funded by the Ministry for the Environment. When the Trust signed the Deed of Funding in 2021, we committed to meet various targets by the end of the project and I'm pleased to say we are right on track, and even exceeding some as the months speed by. I've just finished writing our annual report and in the last year we have planted over 55,000 plants, controlled 8.7 hectares of weeds, and are doing predator control over 95 hectares. The planting has occurred on the properties of nine landowners, as well as council reserves. The community has helped us by supporting planting days and other activities such as education days with schools.

Volunteers contributed 450 hours of their time in June alone which is phenomenal. If you would like to join our monthly weekend field volunteer team, or the fortnightly weekday field volunteer team then get in touch with Maddie Meier maddie@thestyx.nz.



One of the sites we have been restoring is where the Kā Pūtahi stream runs next to the Belfast Cemetery, by the motorway overpass. We have planted 4500 plants at this site in the last year. It now looks quite different from when we first started, and the team was battling a mass of tall thistles. Keep an eye out when you go past and see the site transform over time to become a native dominated wetland and forest.

You may also have noticed that we've been more active on Instagram and Facebook in the last few months. Dan Grima, who joined us in April has been posting regular updates on what the Trust is doing within the catchment and showing us some of the hidden treasures. His 'Underwater Wednesday' short videos are a must see. My favourite features an eel checking out the camera and helps to highlight the wonderful animals to be found in our waterways. Another new member to our team is Josh Overend who joined us in May as a field staff intermediate and has thrown himself into the work despite the current frosty mornings and seemingly endless mud. Just as we thought we had a full team again I sadly had to accept the resignation of Loren Pve who is leaving to travel overseas. Loren has been a real asset to the team, and her commitment to maintaining the trap line at Styx Mill Conservation Reserve through all the changing water levels has paid off with high rat catches and hopefully improved bird nesting survival. We wish Loren all the best with her travels.
